

Wildlife cameras

Thanks to funding from the Forestry Focused Future, Knowledge Transfer Grant Scheme for our grey squirrel bark stripping awareness film, we have use of four wildlife cameras.

We plan to continue capturing video evidence of grey squirrel bark stripping and will be looking to position cameras in secure locations with a high probability of damage between April and July 2021.

We are also interested in capturing footage of red squirrels in action outside of the bark stripping months.

Great Scottish Squirrel Survey

Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels' second Great Scottish Squirrel Survey during Red Squirrel Awareness Week was a resounding success.

Three times as many people took part this year as in 2019 and eight times more sightings were reported than in a normal week.

Dr Mel Tonkin, Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels Project Manager said: "We'd like to thank everyone who took the time to report a squirrel sighting during the survey. It's been inspiring to see more people than ever taking time to enjoy nature and be on the look-out for squirrels."

Research on squirrel topics

Modelling different grey squirrel management methods

UK Squirrel Accord is <u>funding research</u> into an oral contraceptive to reduce grey squirrel populations. To compliment this, the Animal and Plant Health Agency are also developing a model to compare management methods.

The first research paper on the modelling work has now been published: <u>A spatially explicit population model to compare management using culling and fertility control to reduce numbers of grey squirrels</u>. Click on the title to gain free access to the paper before 23 January 2021.

The team compared culling and fertility control separately, and then a combination of short-term culling with multi-year fertility control. Results showed fertility control alone to be slower to reduce numbers but is highlighted by a previous study as a more publicly acceptable management method. One year of culling followed by ongoing fertility control was shown to more rapidly reduce or eradicate grey squirrel populations.

The modelling work is based on conservative estimates of the efficacy of the oral contraceptive and can be updated as our research evolves.

UK attitudes to squirrels and management

Through involvement with the Red Squirrels United (RSU) programme, Forest Research conducted a survey comparing public attitudes to red squirrels and grey squirrel management between RSU red squirrel areas and the wider UK.

The following paper has been published and is freely available: <u>The red zone: Attitudes towards</u> <u>squirrels and their management where it matters</u> <u>most</u>

Analysis of survey responses showed a significant difference in the understanding of the relationships between red and grey squirrels by residents in RSU areas than those of the wider public – who are more likely to have little or no knowledge.

There was a greater desire from both residents in RSU areas and the wider public to see red squirrels rather than grey squirrels in parks, gardens, and the countryside. RSU participants were less keen to see grey squirrels in any environment and hold red squirrels in higher regard than elsewhere in the UK.

Raising awareness of the need for invasive species management is identified as key for conservation.
